It is not usual practice to tip in Singapore, although it is appreciated by service staff. Most hotels and restaurants quote prices as "++," which includes 10 percent service charge and 7 percent goods and services tax (GST).



ith Singapore turning the big 5-0 on 9
August this year, the whole nation is pulling out all the stops to make this Golden
Jubilee celebration a truly memorable one.

Get to know modern Singapore on a deeper level with **Diverse-City Trails** (www.trails. thethoughtcollective.com. sg) by local organisation, The Thought Collective. Supported by Ben & Jerry's, these walking tours cover issues the city faces around social cohesion, and takes participants to neighbourhoods including Little India, Toa Payoh, and Jalan Besar. Tickets cost \$20, and the trails will run until 13 September.

For more engaging trails to discover Singapore, sign up for one of the **mySG Trails** and Exhibitions (mysg-trailsexhibitions, moe.edu.sg).

Over 70 schools in Singapore are part of this youth-led initiative, which boasts highlights like a food trail in Jurong and a heritage tour of Bukit Panjang. For specific trail schedules and registration, visit the official website (as trails run at various times throughout 2015).

For great entertainment and a breath of fresh air, head to the various parks across Singapore for the **Concert Series in the Park** (www.nparks.gov.sg/sg50). This mini-series of free public concerts will be held through December, and will see local talents and community performing groups on stage.

For something similar on a much bigger scale, there's the two-hour-long **Sing50 Concert** (www.sing50concert. sg) on 7 August. Held at the new National Stadium at Singapore Sports Hub, this mega-concert pays homage to the most

celebrated songs, performers, and composers that mark Singapore's milestones in the music industry.

Singapore might be small, but we pack a punch. Not only can you get your kids in for free at some attractions like Sentosa and the Science Centre Singapore, you'll be hard-pressed to leave the city empty-handed with all the shopping promotions in town. hether or not you're into motorsports, September is an exhilarating time to be in Singapore, when the Lion City is all revved up and ready for the 2015 Formula 1 Singapore Airlines Singapore Grand Prix (18 to 20 September). Now in its eighth year, look forward to a weekend filled with high-octane action both on and off the track.

Of course, the star of the show is the thrilling race, as renowned Formula 1 drivers like Lewis Hamilton and Sebastian Vettel battle to the finish line. Some of the world's hottest musical acts, including American Grammy award-winning superstar Pharrell Williams (18 September)



efore helming 545 Whampoa Prawn Noodles... I worked in an MNC for a few years, but couldn't find purpose in my job. I quit the company and found myself helping out at my father's stall while considering my options. Eventually, I opened my own stall in Tekka, and it was one of the best decisions I've made.

A solid bowl of prawn noodles... should have a flavoursome broth. I use only wild-caught prawns for the sweetness they give. For dry prawn noodles, the balance of the condiments is crucial.

What I love most about Singapore... is the variety of food options on the island. You can find all kinds of cuisines from Mexican to Russian.

I've lived in... Ang Mo Kio all my life, and I grew up eating all the delicious local food from the hawker centres in the neighbourhood, like the food centre at 628 Ang Mo Kio Ave 4, and the coffeeshop at 151 Ang Mo Kio Ave 5.

If you only have time for one place in Little

India... make it Tekka Centre. It's a wet market, food centre and shopping mall rolled into one, offering everything from casual clothing and religious paraphernalia to fresh produce and local food from several ethnic communities.

New Ubin Seafood... serves one of the city's best black pepper crab. It has a unique smoky taste that doesn't undermine the freshness of the crustacean. Their US Angus ribeye, seasoned simply and perfectly cooked, is also worth having.

I am very proud... to be living in Singapore. I feel safe going out in the middle of the night for a supper – streets are brightly lit, and there are many eateries that open 24 hours a day. My go-to supper spots are 126 Eating House in Geylang for dim sum, and Ming Fa Fishball in Bedok.

To enjoy the 7 percent Goods and Services Tax (GST) refunds paid on your purchases under the **Tourist Tax Refund Scheme**, you must make at least \$\$100 worth of purchases from participating outlets. Such shops will display a 'Tax **Refund'** logo or a **Global Blue 'Tax Free Shopping'** logo. On your day of departure from **Singapore Changi Airport**, proceed to the Tax Refund Counter and present your purchases together with the tax claim forms for customs inspection. Take note that Customs will not process the tax claim forms if the goods are not presented for inspection. eTRS TAX FREE



Skip the queues and file your GST claims at the eTRS self-help kiosk at Changi Airport before you fly! Tourists departing on international cruises from Marina Bay Cruise Centre Singapore and the International Passenger Terminal at HarbourFront Centre may also qualify for tax refund.
